CCCCD Impacts Area Economy

The Contra Costa Community College District (CCCCD) colleges have boosted the local economy for nearly 60 years.

CCCCD is a sound investment from multiple perspectives. Students benefit from improved lifestyles and increased earnings. Taxpayers benefit from a more robust economy and lower social costs. The community as a whole benefits from increased job and investment opportunities, higher business revenues, greater availability of public funds and an eased tax burden:

CCCCD positively impacts students, employers, taxpayers, business, and state and local government in the following ways:

Stimulating State and Local Economy

- District operations and capital spending injects \$113 million annually into increased regional income.
- 14% of students who come from outside the county to attend our colleges produce \$15 million in regional income.
- The District is truly an engine of economic growth for the county, producing \$3.5 billion in income through past and present efforts.

Leveraging Taxpayer Dollars

- Taxpayers see an expanding tax base and reduced tax burden because students with college degrees earn higher wages.
- Social costs are avoided with higher wage earners, including savings associated with improved health, reduced crime, and fewer welfare and unemployment claims.
- Students with a community college education generate \$143 million annually in higher earnings.

Generating Return on Investment

 State and local government see a rate of return of 10% from their support of CCCCD — comparing very favorably with similar long-term investments in the private sector.

Increasing Student Earning Potential

- Students who earn an associate of arts or science degree can expect an increased income of approximately \$9,500 per year for every year of employment than someone with only a high school diploma.
- Students enjoy a 21% annual rate of return on their community college educational investment, recovering all costs — including wages lost while attending college — in just seven years.

MEASURE A 2002 and MEASURE A+ 2006 BACKGROUND

Voters of Contra Costa County have passed two facility bond measures enabling the Contra Costa Community College District to refurbish aging facilities, build new facilities to accommodate enrollment growth and purchase sorely needed equipment for classrooms.

Measure A. is a \$120 million bond measure passed on March 5, 2002. and Measure A+ is a \$286.5 million bond measure passed on June 6, 2006.

Much Needed Upgrades

Aging facilities are receiving much-needed upgrades, while faculty. students and staff are enjoying modernized facilities designed to meet the growing technological demands of the 21st century. Some of the projects are mentioned below.

- · Student Services building
- · Library remodel
- · Vocational Technology remodel

DVC

- · Bookstore
- · San Ramon Campus
- · Planetarium

LMC

- · Learning Resource Center

In our quest to become more environmentally friendly and energy efficient, the District is becoming "greener" with the addition of solar panel collection system. covers located in key parking lots at the colleges. The enemy generated will offset nearly one third of the District's total energy consumption and provide covered student parking.

Dear Citizens:

The Measure A Bond Oversight Committee is pleased to present this report to the community. The Committee monitors the expenditure of the voter-approved 2002 Measure A and 2006 Measure A+ facility improvement bond funds, and takes this responsibility very seriously.

Each bond requires two annual audits - an independent performance audit to ensure bond money is used only for voter-approved projects and a financial audit of revenues and expenditures. Annually, the independent audits are reviewed by the Committee and then presented to the CCCCD. Governing Board for approval. 
One area of concern to the Bond Oversight Committee involves the use. of bond funds to deal with deferred maintenance. While Measures A and A+ allow for the use of bond funds to correct instances of deferred maintenance. the Committee is mindful of its responsibility to ensure that bond money is not used to pay for salaries or other administrative expenses. Routine maintenance expenses are normally funded out of the operational budget, competing with salary compensation and benefit expenses. The fact is that state funding for programmed maintenance is inadequate, which forces the District to budget operational funds in a manner that causes more bond money to be used for maintenance than would otherwise be the case. The Committee has asked that the CCCCD Governing Board review and approve all instances of deferred maintenance, to grovide tight control over this issue.

The Bond Oversight Committee is gratified to report that the District remains a good steward of public funds, and continues to be in compliance. of the requirements of Proposition 39, as it has been since the inception of the bond program in 2002.

Thank you for your support and your confidence in the District and in its mission to provide higher education in our communities. Because of you, CCCCO continues to play an important role in the community, with positive economic impact, excellence in education, and now, a model for innovative, yet affective campus improvements and expansions
