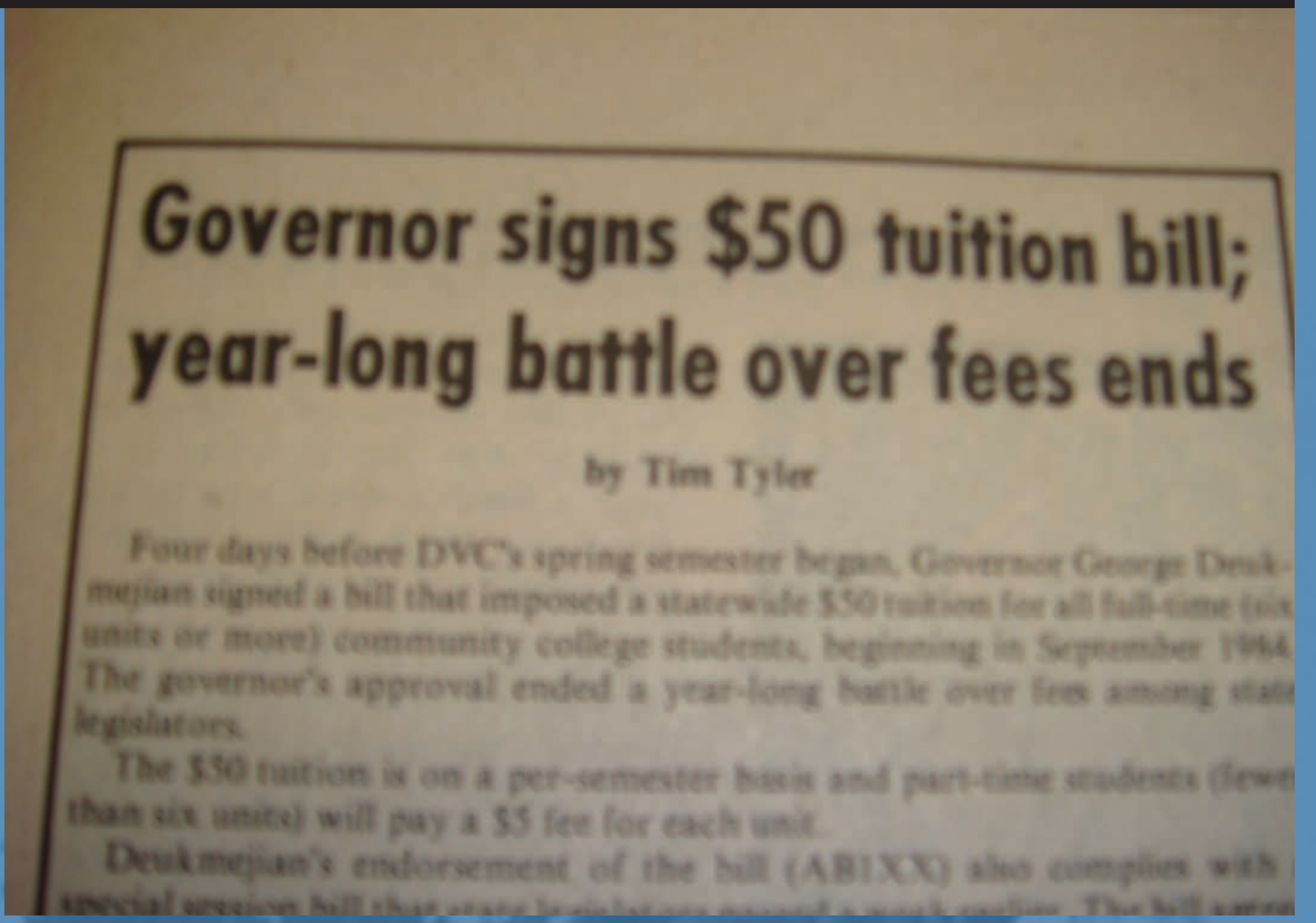


Battling a state budget crisis, the Governing Board approves parking fees for students in 1982.

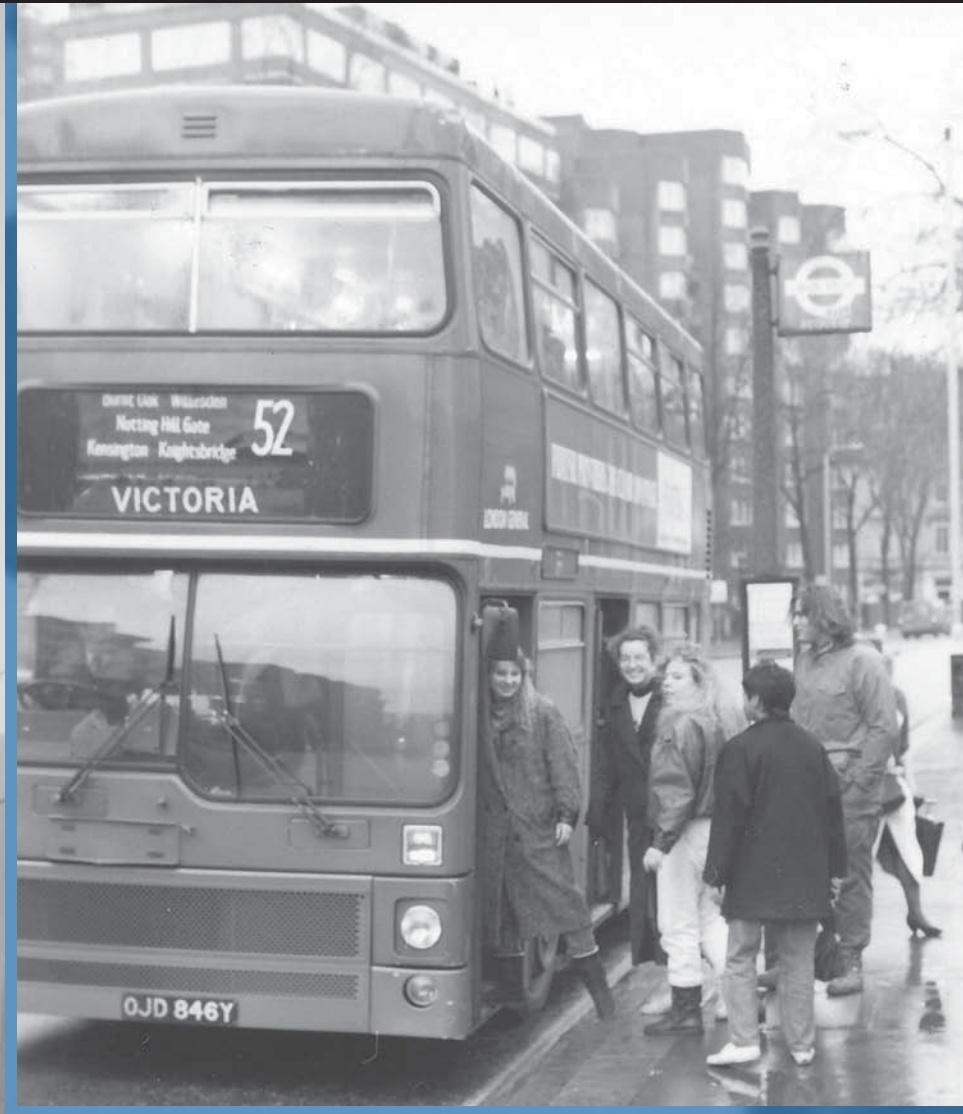
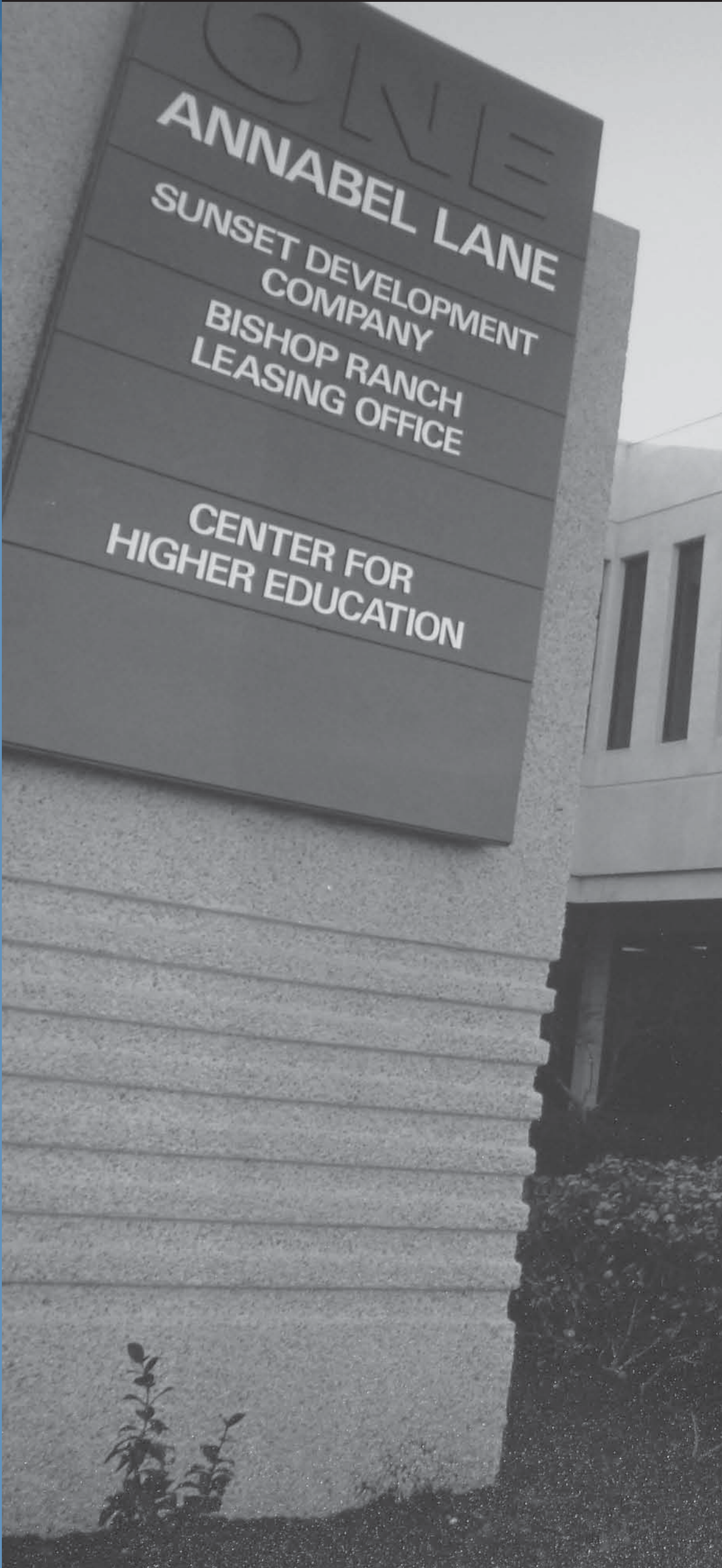

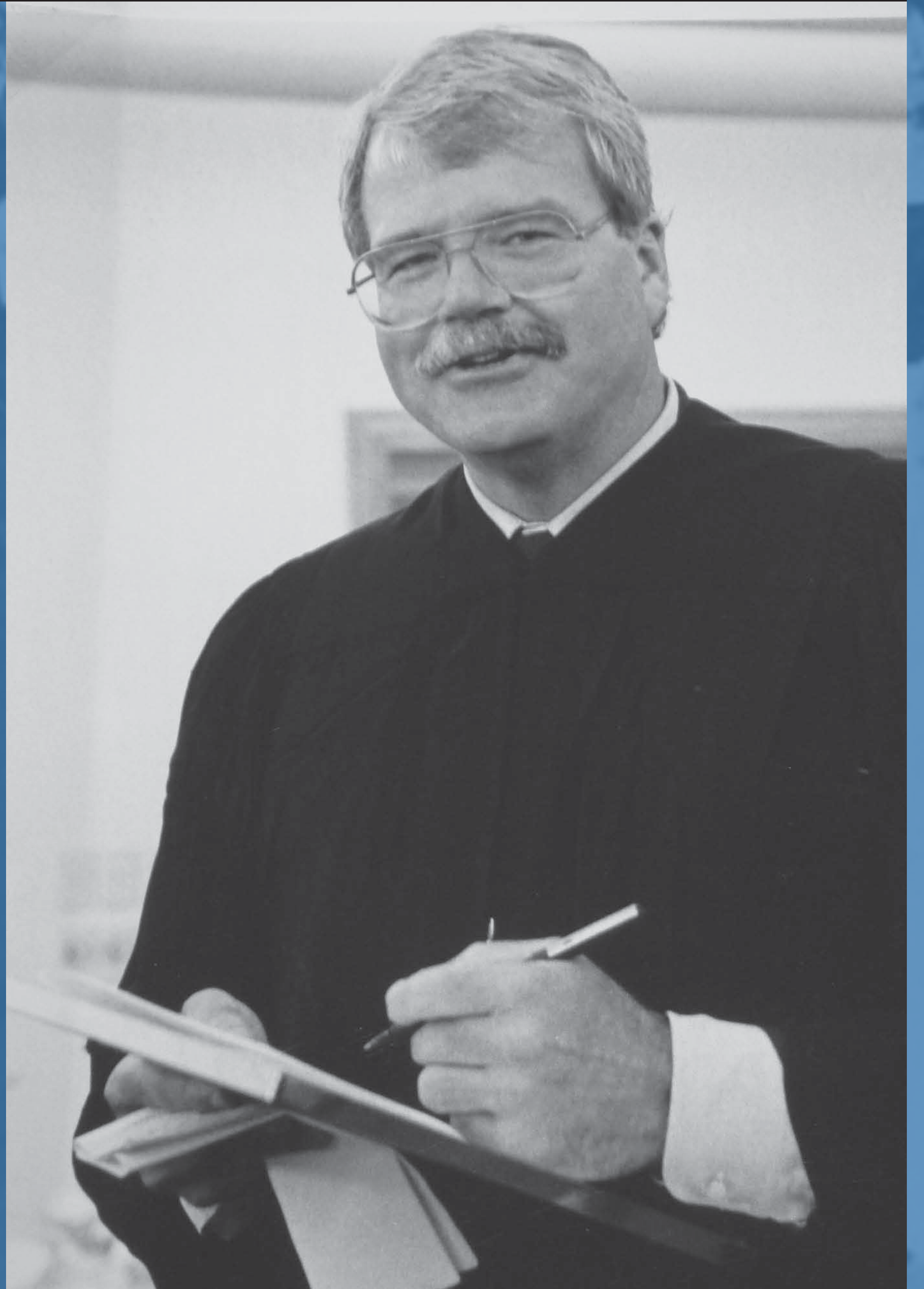
In 1985, the District opens the Center for Higher Education in San Ramon to meet the growing educational needs in South County.
