The purpose of the Chancellor's Cabinet is to serve as the leadership team, ensuring the sustainability of our District to educate all students effectively and equitably. Chancellor's Cabinet members lead in empowering and meeting the needs of our diverse communities in partnership with classified professionals, faculty, and other managers as we achieve the mission of the 4CD.

Accessibility Capability Maturity Model (ACMM)

Vice Chancellor, Education and Technology, Kelly Schelin reported that 4CD has been accepted into the State Chancellor's ACMM 2026-27 cohort. ACMM is a structured framework designed to promote proactive risk mitigation and continuous improvement as it relates to accessibility across the District. In-person training is tentatively scheduled for September, with assessments at each college following the kick-off. The assessment findings will be shared with the District later in the fall.

Enrollment Update

Vice Chancellor, Education and Technology, Kelly Schelin provided an enrollment update showing the latest data for Spring 2026.

Labor Negotiations

Associate Vice Chancellor/Chief Human Resources Officer Dr. Jeffrey Michels provided updates on negotiations with both United Faculty and Local 1.

Transition from TOP to CIP Codes

Vice Chancellor, Education and Technology, Kelly Schelin discussed the transition from California's unique Taxonomy of Programs (TOP) codes to the national Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) codes, due to changes at the state level. Curricular updates are expected to be completed by the end of 2026. This shift standardizes data with federal requirements and universities, improves program comparison, and reduces the administrative burden of managing dual reporting systems.
