DVC Breaks Ground For New Commons Project

t was a hot, sunny afternoon on June 20, 2011, as employees of Diablo Valley College (DVC), District staff, representatives from the project's architectural firm and general contractor, and community members gathered in the quad area to memorialize the kick-off of the New Commons Project. The \$52 million project encompasses four pri-

mary elements, including student services, food services, culinary arts instructional programs, and the central quad. Over 86,000 square feet of new buildings will be constructed. The funding for this project has been made possible by Contra Costa County voters through Bond Measure A passed in 2006.

"As the former Pleasant Hill mayor, I know first-hand how important this college is to our community," says Supervisor


Mitchoff. "Many of you may not know this, but I am a graduate of DVC and proud of it."


picking up one injured rider and his bike. All department riders completed the ride in good shape and experienced no breakdowns.

Contra Costa College Wins Statewide Honor for Outstanding Program Outcomes Assessment

Winning a statewide award is a highly coveted honor. But it was really special when a statewide organization decided to award two awards so that each contributing department receives recognition.



The Research & Planning Group for California Community Colleges decided to award their 2011 Promising Outcomes Work and Exemplary Research (POWER) Award for Outstanding Program Outcomes Assessment to Contra Costa College's Speech and Culinary Arts departments. A committee of student learning outcomes experts, researchers from the Research and Planning Group, and the Academic Senate of California Community Colleges judge this annual statewide competition.

"We were so impressed by the work that your two departments have done that we decided to give two program assessment awards this year instead of one," said POWER awards committee chair Marcy Alancraig. "The committee was delighted by the innovative ways that each department used program outcomes assessment to improve student success, and we believe Contra Costa College (CCC) is a statewide model in this area."

The POWER awards will be officially presented at a preconference session at the Strengthening Student Success Conference on Wednesday, Oct. 12, 2011, at the San Francisco Airport Marriott.

"We have built a wonderful, collaborative environment at CCC that allows the college to make good decisions based on data," says senior dean of research and planning **Tim Clow**. "To be recognized as a model for the state is humbling, and we are honored to be judged by our peers as being innovative in improving student success."



Leadership Updates for DVC and LMC

A t their June 22, 2011, meeting, the Governing Board of the Contra Costa Community College District approved the contracts for **Peter Garcia** to be the permanent President, Diablo Valley College, and **Richard Livingston** to continue as the Interim President, Los Medanos College.

After conducting a nationwide search to fill the vacant position of President, Diablo Valley College, it was decided that Peter Garcia, the Interim President since October 2010, would be reassigned from Los Medanos College, to Diablo Valley College permanently. Peter's 3-year contract was effective July 1, 2011.

The reassignment of Peter Garcia to Diablo Valley College left a vacancy at Los Medanos College. A nationwide search was conducted for an interim replacement, and Richard Livingston was selected to continue in his role as interim President, Los Medanos College, for the 2011-12 academic year. A search will begin later this year for a permanent president.

"Peter and Richard provided strong leadership during their interim roles," says chancellor **Helen Benjamin**. "These decisions offer stability for the District as we manage the challenging fiscal climate while meeting the educational needs of our students."

AACC Northern California Listening Tour

The American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) held their northern California stop of their national Listening Tour at DVC on Thursday, July 21, 2011, in the Arena Theater. The purpose of these regional meetings is for the national organization to gain insights about pressing issues confront-

ing community colleges and their more than 12 million students.

AACC will review and synthesize all the findings and produce a report that creates a new vision for the future of community colleges. The final report will be presented at the organization's 2012 national conference in Orlando, Florida.

"I give credit to AACC for taking the time to listen to folks across the country as they try to develop a new vision for community colleges nationally," says DVC senior dean **Ted Wieden**. "Change will be difficult, so I look forward to reviewing the final report when it is released next year."

The mission of the District is to attract and transform students and communities by providing accessible, innovative and outstanding higher education learning opportunities and support services.

As many of us were relaxing and celebrating the long 4th of July Aweekend, a harrowing fishing boat accident in Mexico's Sea of Cortez had Police Chief **Charles Gibson** swimming for his life. He fortunately was one of the lucky ones who survived the ordeal after huge waves capsized his chartered fishing boat named "The Erik" around 2:30 a.m. on Sunday, July 3, 2011.



Chief **Charles Gibson** spoke recently to a standing room-only crowd in the District Office Board Room about his experience surviving a recent Mexican fishing boat accident.

The story was covered internationally but had a strong local angle since many of the fishermen were from northern California. One fisherman is dead and seven others are still missing. To survive, Gibson swam alone for approximately nine hours as he tried to reach land.

"All my belongings, including my watch, are at the bottom of the ocean," says Gibson. "I was in the water for about 17 hours overall. I think it was a total of my life experience that I kept reflecting on – my family, friends, and situations that motivated me to keep on swimming."

"Chief Gibson's story was outstanding and told an unbelievable story of perseverance and faith," says Director of Purchasing and Contracts **Dave Wetmore**. "My family had a chartered fishing business, and I grew up enjoying and respecting the ocean. I want to thank the Chief for sharing with us his incredible experience."

Gibson received numerous requests about the incident from District employees and decided to give a presentation about his survival on July 26, 2011, in the District Office Board Room. The presentation was videotaped with the goal of making it available within the next few weeks.

District Meets with CCC Community Leaders

The last few years have been challenging times for community colleges, and the District decided it was important to spend time with the local community to share how things are changing for higher education in the county. Community meetings, associated with each college, are being held to open up this conversation and seek ideas and suggestions from community, business, and political leaders, on how best the District can continue meeting the higher education needs of our students and our community.



West County elected officials and community leaders listened to presentations about the state of the District and CCC at this community meeting.

The first meeting was held at Contra Costa College on July 19, 2011, in the Fireside Room. Attendees, including Richmond Mayor Gayle McLaughlin and West Contra Costa County Unified School district school board member Antonio Medrano, heard chancellor **Helen Benjamin** share a presentation on the "State of the District" while President **McKinley Williams** talked about the successes and challenges at CCC. Also in attendance were Governing Board members Robert Calone and John E. Marquez.

"The community members really appreciated the opportunity to hear what is going on with our District as a whole, but especially at CCC," says Benjamin. "Our success depends on the partnership with the community, so we plan to continue having these conversations."

The community meeting for LMC is scheduled for Wednesday, August 10, 2011, 6:30 p.m., and the DVC community meeting will be held on Wednesday, August 24, 2011, at 6:30 p.m.
