DVC Receives Upward Bound Grant

olks at Diablo Valley College (DVC) were in a celebratory mood when they received a letter from the United States Department of Education (USDE) announcing they were selected to receive a five-year grant at \$250,000 annually, to create an Upward Bound program in collaboration with the Mt. Diablo Unified School District.



The grant proposal was written by DVC academic student services manager

Jackie Jones-Castellano and DVC Foundation director Cindy Goga and begins in the 2012-13 academic year. It will focus on 9th and 10th grade students from disadvantaged backgrounds who aspire to attend college and have the commitment to complete an intensive program of academic support so they can be college-ready.

"We appreciate the opportunity and challenge to help 60 students from Mt. Diablo High School and Ygnacio Valley High School reach their full potential," says Jones-Castellano. "Participants in the Upward Bound program must be first-generation college students, low-income individuals, or individuals who have a high risk for academic failure, and has a high need for academic support to be successful."

DVC was also successful in obtaining another USDE grant earlier this academic year entitled "Educational Talent Search", a 5-year grant at \$300,000 per year that provides broad based services to over 660 middle and high school students in the Mt. Diablo Unified School District.




2012 4CDLI Graduates


A fter a grueling and challenging four-month program, it was all smiles for the graduates of the 2012 Contra Costa Community College District Leadership Institute (4CDLI) program.
