Kennedy King Scholarship Awards

n May 15, 2014, the annual Kennedy-King Memorial College Scholarship banquet was held to recognize the 2014 recipients of the program. All the awardees are graduating students of the Contra Costa Community College District, and the event provides donors and guests an opportunity to meet and hear the inspirational stories of the students.

The Kennedy-King Memorial Scholarship, founded in 1968 in memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Senator Robert F. Kennedy, provides a two-year scholarship (totaling \$8,000) to underrepresented, minority students with financial need who have demonstrated academic success at one of the three community colleges in Contra Costa County. Eligible scholars must have completed at least two years of study at Contra Costa College, Diablo Valley College, or Los Medanos College, and been accepted to a fouryear university for pursuant of an undergraduate degree. The memorial fund also grants one-year \$4,000 scholarships to previous undergraduate recipients for use towards a graduate degree.

Since 1968, the Kennedy-King Memorial Fund has awarded close to \$3,546,000 in scholarships to 683 students.

Pathway to Law School

The California Community Colleges and The State Bar of California announced in May 2014 a new initiative that will provide students at 24 community colleges a smoother pathway to six of California's top law schools. Contra Costa College is among the community colleges selected for the Community Colleges Pathway to Law School initiative that will enhance opportunities and advancement in the legal profession for diverse populations, particularly those who have been underrepresented.

The project, sponsored by the State Bar's Council on Access and Fairness, established agreements with two dozen community colleges and six law schools and their respective undergraduate institutions.



Students in the program will receive assurances that credits in prescribed courses will transfer, obtain early exposure to the law school experience including individual advisement and mentoring from law school advisors, financial aid counseling, LSAT preparation, and waived application fees for admission to the participating law schools.

"CCC is excited to be a part of this initiative because it increases opportunities for our students," said Vice President **Tammeil Gilkerson**. "It not only allows us to collaborate with some of the finest law schools in the nation but strengthens our partnership with the law academies in West Contra Costa Unified School District, providing students a clear pathway to a legal career."

Participating law schools are University of Southern California Gould School of Law, University of San Francisco School of Law, UC Davis School of Law, UC Irvine School of Law, Santa Clara University School of Law and Loyola Law School.

District's Teacher of the Year

The Diablo Valley College (DVC) Academic Senate selected Professor **Patrick Leong** as the District nominee for the annual Teacher of the Year program. Leong joins 21 other nominees from Contra Costa County schools who are being recognized as outstanding instructors, with a county finalist selected in September who will compete for the statewide honor.

With almost 20 years as a professor at DVC, Leong credits his colleagues as sources of inspiration.

"I credit my colleagues for my sources of inspiration. As I begin my 20th year at DVC and 23rd year of college teaching, never in my wildest dream would I have imagined receiving this recognition," said

Leong. "A few years upon my arrival at DVC, my English colleague, Laury Fischer, had just been named the Teacher of the Year. I was in such awe. How fantastic that someone's passion for teaching would put them head and shoulders above their colleagues."

In addition to his work with the Puente Program, which aims to increase the number of underrepresented community college students who enroll in four-year colleges and universities, Leong also serves as chair of the DVC Scholarship Committee.
