

District Thanks Voters for Passing Measure E

A Message to the Community:

n behalf of the Contra Costa Community College District (District), we thank voters for your support of Measure E, a \$450 million facilities bond measure passed on June 3rd. We thank the businesses, organizations, volunteers, endorsers, employees, and students who made important contributions in passing this much-needed bond measure. Our colleges – Contra Costa College, Diablo Valley College and the San Ramon Campus, and Los Medanos College and



the Brentwood Center – can now continue their effort in providing the supportive learning environment for our students to be successful.

Over the years, we have overcome many challenges and achieved many goals. However, the most noticeable change we have seen has been the improvements our District has made because of the passage of previous bond facilities measures in 2002 and 2006. As a result of the passage of these measures, we have made seismic retrofits and ADA compliance improvements at Contra Costa College, constructed the new Student Services Center at Diablo Valley College, and built the permanent San Ramon Campus, and constructed new science and math buildings at Los Medanos College, among many other improvements to our facilities.

These are not nice-to-have improvements, but priority projects that help us serve all of our students in preparing them for 21st century jobs. With the passage of Measure E, we can continue renovating buildings constructed in the 1950s and '60s or building new facilities, make the campuses fully accessible to all students, upgrade our aging infrastructure, complete more seismic safety improvements, and build a permanent facility in Brentwood.

We assure you that we take the stewardship of public funds seriously and will continue to conduct annual performance and financial audits as required by law and work collaboratively with the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (Committee) members as mandated for Proposition 39 school bonds.

It was December 27, 1948, when the Board of Supervisors approved the formation of the Contra Costa Junior College District, now known as the Contra Costa Community College District. For the past 65 years, we have been helping our students transfer to four-year colleges or get the training needed to obtain good paying jobs. We are proud of our legacy and look forward to serving the community for many years to come.

On behalf of our Governing Board, our 3,100 employees, and over 55,000 students annually who count on us as a critical safety net for affordable, quality local higher education, thank you for your support of Measure E.

Chancellor Presides Over Juneteenth Event

The local community got a chance to see Chancellor Helen Benjamin in a festive role as she presided as the Grand Marshall of the 11th annual Juneteenth Family Day Parade and Festival in Richmond. The annual event is sponsored by the Neighborhood Block Association, Chevron and the City of Richmond, and took place at Nicholl Park.

The Richmond Juneteenth festival is one of the largest in California. Event organizers estimated that more than 20,000 people attended this year's festival, which is a long cry from the 100 that showed up to the first celebration 11 years ago.

Juneteenth commemorates June 19, 1865, when slaves in Galveston, Texas, were informed by Union soldiers that the

Civil War had ended more than a month earlier and they were free.

DVC Swimmer Wins CCCAA Female Athlete of the Year Honor

After a stellar, recordbreaking season, Diablo Valley College (DVC) swimmer Allison Gargalikis has been named the



California Community College Athletic Association (CCCAAA) Female Athlete of the Year. As a graduate of Carondelet High School in Concord, Gargalikis began her college career at UCLA before attending DVC. Her superior performance with the DVC women's swim team garnered nine All-American titles.

Gargalikis led the Vikings to a state championship after breaking records in the 200 and 400 medley relays, the 100-yard breaststroke, the 50 breaststroke and 50 butterfly competitions. She leads community colleges nationwide with an individual time of 1:00.71 in the 100-yard breaststroke, which set a new pool record for East Los Angeles College's Swim Stadium Pool.

In addition to Gargalikis setting the pace with multiple records in the pool; she paced her classmates by boasting a 4.0 GPA for the Spring 2014 semester, raising her cumulative GPA to 3.8.
