DVC Hosts Expanding Your Horizons Conference

Fu's position at Ghirardelli Chocolate Company was just one of the many Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) careers explored at Diablo Valley College's (DVC) Expanding Your Horizons Conference.

The inspirational event attracted 160 middle school girls from 38 schools around the Bay Area, all whom gathered to learn more about STEM career opportunities for women. As the students enjoyed interactive workshops led by STEM faculty and local STEM professionals, their parents attended college preparatory sessions where they

were provided information on financial aid, college and career planning, and supporting their daughter's interests in STEM.

Tina Dodson, DVC's Workforce Development Manager, helped organize the conference and credits Chevron and DVC staff for the event's success.

As a Senior Buyer at the District Office, Cayabyab has over 15 years of experience in the procurement profession

and serves on several professional committees. Through his roles as chairman of the Northern California Community College Purchaser's Group and vice chair of the San Francisco Bay Area Chapter of the California Association of Public Procurement Officials (CAPPO), Cayabyab's leadership and commitment are exemplified.

Purchasing professionals are key in managing the CollegeBuys purchasing program, which is operated by the Foundation for California Community Colleges. The program is designed to help colleges save money on education-related purchases and has facilitated nearly \$9 million in savings for colleges for the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

"Collaboration is the key to this profession," said Cayabyab. "If all the community colleges stick together, we can continue to get better pricing and better deals for everyone."
