and Antioch high school seniors listened to former NASA astronaut Jose Hernandez share his inspirational story. Hernandez overcame multiple challenges as a first generation college student from Stockton in order to graduate from a University of California (UC) school and become an astronaut. Hernandez told the students NASA rejected him 11 times, but he never quit, and was accepted the 12th time he applied. He went to space in 2009 - proof that perseverance pays off.

The *Achieve UC* event was hosted in partnership with the UC system, who have made recent efforts to broaden the diversity of their student body.

Later that evening, another LMC event aimed to further the conversation surrounding equity and diversity during their TEDx event, *The Future of Everything*. TEDx is a program of local, self-organized events that brings people together to share a TED-like experience and exchange ideas. At TEDx events, speakers share stories meant to spark deep discussion and connection. LMC's TEDx event featured a diverse group of speakers from varying backgrounds who shared their unique perspectives. Topics included cultural acceptance, conscious living, race relations, entrepreneurship and interpersonal relationships.

I have deep respect and look forward to returning to this great college, and joining my colleagues to transform the lives of our students."
