Diablo Valley College Professor Recognized for STEM



ncouraging underrepresented students to pursue STEM majors is one of many issues District educators are focused on. For Latinx Diablo Valley College (DVC) Math Professor Concha Gomez, it is a personal goal stemming from her own experiences in academia. Her work in this area has led to recognition by global, multi-platform media and entertainment company Mashable as a trailblazing Latina in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). The recognizance is part of Mashable's ongoing series "The Women Fixing STEM," which highlights women paving the way in science, tech, engineering, and math, as well as initiatives and organizations working to close the industries' gender gaps.

For Gomez, it was her experience as an undergraduate student at University of California, Berkeley that motivated her to pursue a career as a STEM professor. As she navigated her upper division STEM classes, Gomez recalls feeling invisible and out of place as one of few minority students in the room and the only Latinx student in most of her classes. Now a professor herself, Gomez pulls from those memories to ensure that each of her students feel like visible, valued members of class. She uses her past experiences as momentum to encourage the next generation of Latinx students in STEM at DVC and beyond. Outside of the classroom, Gomez has also worked with SACNAS, whose mission is to foster the success of Native Americans and Chicanos/Hispanics in STEM fields.

Gomez sees the *Mashable* article as a positive sign that more and more people are paying attention to the underrepresentation of Latinx students in STEM, especially among women. "I've actually heard from young women pursuing STEM degrees who saw the article and were inspired by the women featured," shared Concha. "It means a lot for them to see future versions of themselves."
