ew Governing Board Student Trustee Shreejal Luitel is a first-generation Middle College High School (MCHS) student from Nepal who is pursuing an associate's degree in Computer Science and Business Administration at Contra Costa College (CCC). Shreeial is the president of the CCC's Speech and Debate team where he has helped increase Speech Team membership and contributed to the team's 15 awards during the 2018-19 academic year.

Although Shreejal describes his involvement in student government as "modest," he has been very involved in his community since 2016. He served as the chairperson of the Recycling Committee in Leadership during his freshman year of high school and is

now the co-founder and co-CEO of RichmondCodes, an organization that offers one-day computer science workshops to children who come from underrepresented and underserved backgrounds. Passionate about leveling the playing field by ensuring equity for all students, Shreejal will work with other Board members, faculty, staff and students to increase student success through measureable outcomes.

"I am very excited to serve as the District Student Trustee," said Shreejal. "I want to work alongside the Student Union Presidents, Student Life Office Coordinators, marketing team, faculty and most importantly our students to create a strong communication chain."

# **Diablo Valley College Student Wins Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship Award**



Jack Kent Cooke scholarship recipient Joseph Carter was recognized by Chancellor Fred Wood and members of the Governing Board for winning the prestigious scholarship award.

iablo Valley College (DVC) student Joseph Carter always dreamed of transferring to a four-year college, but was unsure of how he would afford it. Though he originally enrolled at DVC with the goal of becoming an electrician, he made a positive impression on his professors who recognized his potential. "Professor Steve Narin was my first math professor at DVC. He re-inspired my love for math after my high school teachers did a great job of squelching those, and gave me the tools to grasp the ideas and concepts that engineers need."

His newfound interest led him to join MESA (Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement), a statewide program for economically underrepresented students that offers specialized STEM tutoring as well as mentorship and networking opportunities. Joseph began taking more challenging STEM courses and applying to scholarships as he prepared to transfer to a four-year university. He was overjoyed to find out he had won the esteemed Jack Kent Cooke Foundation (JKCF) Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship award.

Recipients of the JCKF scholarship are awarded up to \$40,000 per year to complete a bachelor's degree at a four-year college or university. The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation, established in 2000, is a private, independent foundation dedicated to advancing the education of exceptionally promising students who have financial need. The Foundation was created through the will of prominent businessman, sportsman, and philanthropist Jack Kent Cooke.

Looking ahead, Joseph plans to pursue a bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering at the University of California, San Diego where he'll explore renewable energy sources for communities of need.
