Congressional Art Competition

Since his election in 2015, 4CD has had the honor of partnering with Congressman Mark DeSaulnier in judging submissions from students in California's 11th District for the Congressional Art Competition. Recently, three employees from across the district had the opportunity to judge art from students in this year's program. Eric Sanchez, art faculty from Los Medanos College, Marisa Greenberg, Marketing and Communications Coordinator at the District Office, and Anthony Gordon, Fine and Media Arts Department Chair from Contra Costa College, provided their expertise and selected the winning piece created by Menglin Cai of Monte Vista High School, with her submission entitled "Growing Up.", an oil painting of a young girl in bright, festive, traditional garb of Northwest China. Cai shared "The girl is going to a festival and she's wearing a beautiful traditional outfit, and everyone is happy, and because they live in the northwest of China, and they have extremely bad weather, even though something bad is happening, they're enjoying the moment."

Cai said that while the piece was rooted in a particular culture and region, she hoped it would send a universal message from the U.S. Capitol, where it's set to be displayed. The Congressional **Art Competition** is a nationwide program established by the U.S. House of Representatives to recognize and encourage artistic talent around the country.


