## **Women's History Month**

Each March, the world celebrates International Women's Day, a time when we honor the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women – and recommit to gender equity and inclusion. That includes the countless ways that women have shaped 4CD throughout its 75-year history.

Women have been integral to 4CD from the beginning. Many women joined the workforce during the Second World War to support the military effort, including many at the Kaiser Shipyards. Afterward, some took advantage of the G.I. Bill to enroll in what became CCC and

DVC, at a time when higher education was dominated by men.

Yet, it took a few decades before our colleges built programs that specifically addressed the concerns and perspectives of women. By 1970, students could take courses in women's studies. A few years later, a new Women's Reentry Program focused on supporting stay-at-home mothers who wished to attend college while their children were at school. A Women's Center brought together these programs and created opportunities for networking and support.

As the number of women faculty and staff members increased, it became apparent that the administration ranks did not fully represent the diversity of 4CD employees and students. In June 1984, Dr. Phyllis Peterson and Dr. D. Candy Rose broke through the glass ceiling and became the first women to serve as president of 4CD colleges — Dr. Peterson at DVC and Dr. Rose at CCC. Women also played critical roles in ensuring effective leadership in other ways, including three women holding long tenures as chancellor's and superintendent's secretary: Isabel Sargeant, Doris Peck, and Jean Courtney.

Today, the majority of 4CD students are women. With online options, working parents of all genders enjoy new ways to juggle work, education, and family life. Women's and gender studies classes are well established, and women are represented across a variety of faculty and staff roles.

As 4CD celebrates 75 years, we are led by Chancellor **Mojdeh Mehdizadeh**, and for the first time, 4CD's chancellor and three college presidents are all women. As a DVC student, Ms. Mehdizadeh was inspired by Dr. Helen Benjamin, the first female Chancellor at 4CD, demonstrating the power of women role models.

Throughout our administration, faculty, and staff, women are well represented. While we are proud to mark progress, our work is far from done, and we continue to strive for greater inclusion — standing on the shoulders of the giants who paved the path.



## **Chancellors Investiture**

On Thursday, March 28, 2024, the 4CD and Contra Costa County communities came together at Diablo Valley College to join the Governing Board for the investiture of 4CD's 10th permanent chancellor, **Mojdeh Mehdizadeh**.

Touching and impactful speeches were given by **Dr. Jeffrey Michels**, 4CD Governing Board President Rebecca Barrett, current and former 4CD students Ivan Hernandez, Shreejal Luitel, Bridgett Garcia Alvarado, and City of Hercules Councilman Alex Walker-Griffin, and Contra Costa County Clerk Recorder Kristen Connelly.

## **12th Annual Dreamers Conference**

On Thursday, March 7th, Contra Costa College was the host of the 12th annual 4CD Dreamers Conference. The conference, held in partnership with Diablo Valley College and Los Medanos College, was free for undocumented students and allies and aims to provide information, resources, and support for dreamers to succeed in their academic and career goals. The conference featured workshops, panels, keynote speakers, and networking opportunities.

Award-winning author, Aida Salazar was this year's keynote speaker. Salazar is an arts activist, and translator whose writings for adults and children explore issues of identity and social justice. She was born in Mexico and grew up the middle child in a family of seven children in Southeast Los Angeles, where she developed a passion for storytelling and social change. She is the author of several critically acclaimed and award-winning books, including The Moon Within, Land of the Cranes, A Seed in the Sun, and Jovita Wore Pants. Her books have received numerous honors and distinctions, such as a Caldecott Honor, the Américas Award, the Tomás Rivera Children's Book Award, the International Latino Book Awards, the NCTE Charlotte Huck Honor, the Jane Addams Peace Honor, and more.







# **CCC and DVC Win at Speech and Debate Tournament**

Diablo Valley College Speech & Debate won the California Community College Forensics Association State Championship (NCFA) championship at the NCFA Spring Championship Tournament. This marks the third state championship in four years for the Vikings. In addition to this overall win, DVC Speech & Debate was awarded the Jim Miller Perpetual Sweepstakes Award, an award honoring the team with the most points year to year. Finally, Eden Ozeri won the Keeling-Fricker Speaker Award, an award given to the top speaker in the interpretation of literature events. "DVC"s speech and debate team has become the most dominant team in Northern California. Multiple alumni across the team's illustrious history came out to support the team, offering words of wisdom as the students headed into competition," said **Robert Hawkins**, Co-Director of Speech and Debate, and Department Chair of Communication Studies at DVC.

DVC was also awarded the top community college debate program in the country, as well as the overall sweepstakes award at the National Parliamentary Debate Association national tournament taking place at the University of Utah. DVC achieved this against the likes of the University of California Berkeley, Rice University, and Whitman College.

Contra Costa College Middle College student Adrienne Saporsantos was awarded for her performance in varsity Informative speaking. In addition, she earned a 6th place award against a field of multiple contestants from both the community college and university level. CCC earned a 4th place sweepstakes award at the NCFA Spring Championship tournament in the limited entry community college division, for recognition of their overall performances.
